Community Engagement leverages our parent participation efforts to train residents to be leaders in their local communities.


Policy and Advocacy works for progressive legislation around access to education from birth to adulthood.

The Early Care & Education Institute provides one-on-one coaching to home-based child care providers. Our coaches work onsite to improve the quality of programs in areas such as learning environment, educational curriculum, and business management.

We understand the importance of financial stability, which is why our team hired a Business Specialist this Rodriguez Michael provides year. financial coaching and business development to our Family Child Care providers. This (FCC) year department was able to offer \$41,500 in grants to these providers—a 197% increase from FY 2017-2018.


