A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR & CEO



Dear CHCF Friends & Family,

New York City is changing, and with new challenges comes new opportunities for CHCF to meet the developing needs of our community.

With the arrival of over 100,000 migrants and asylum-seekers in NYC, we embarked on an ambitious new project to help the City welcome this new generation of immigrants. CHCF opened a new office in Long Island City to aid and support over 100 families living there full-time, marking the second year in a row that we've opened a new office in a new borough.

With new growth comes pioneering new partnerships. CHCF accepted a generous gift from Mackenzie Scott to grow our grassroots work across our programs - one of 24 organizations nation-wide to receive such funding. The United Way of New York City awarded CHCF a generous grant to support our parent engagement and community empowerment program, which gives our parents training and opportunity to address the most pressing issues they face, and with support from the Robin Hood Foundation, we're continually growing our Mental Health Team that supports the families and providers who are still struggling to return to pre-pandemic life.

All the while, CHCF continues to deliver its remarkable grassroots services to working families across the city. We distributed backpacks to our returning students, COVID test kits to children and their families, and Thanksgiving meals that gave thousands of New Yorkers an equal opportunity to enjoy the holidays, while also providing workshops on issues like housing, immigration, and child care. We gave out thousands of books, literacy kits, and school supplies to children and families in underserved spaces, and another class of our high school interns achieved a 100% college admissions rate.

Our hard work is being noticed. This year, UnidosUS named CHCF their Northeast Regional Affiliate of the Year, elected us to their Affiliate Council, and honored the team at their annual conference headlined by Vice President Kamala Harris. Through this year of rebounds and resiliency, we are honored to stand with our current and new partners, allowing us to stay at the forefront of positive change for the communities we serve.

All of this would not be possible without our funders and supporters who continued to aid our mission. Without the support of partners like Robin Hood Foundation, MacKenzie Scott, UnidosUS, and Northwestern Mutual Foundation, to name a few, we would have been unable to serve the 75,000 parents and children impacted by our direct services and advocacy work this year.

We have lots to be proud of for 42 remarkable years of mission-driven work, and you'll find just a hint of that success in the following pages. As we face the coming year of continued growth and expansion, CHCF invites you to volunteer with us, donate, or otherwise contribute to our mission of uplifting our families, children, providers, and partners. You're an essential part of our success, and we can't wait to work with you.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Over the past year, New York City saw the sudden arrival of over 100,000 migrants and asylum seekers. In collaboration with Housing Works, CHCF opened a new office at the Best Western Hotel in Long Island City, Queens, where 110 migrant families are living fulltime.

From this location, CHCF will be able to provide legal services, material support, and social service work on-site and full-time.


